Dear Parents and Carers.

The first 3 weeks at Richardson Primary School have been jam-packed full of learning. Each class have been working to establish a successful learning community by building trusting and collaborative relationships. When the culture is right, our students feel safe and willing to take risks with their learning. Here at Richardson we do this in many ways:

- All classes have worked together to create essential agreements. Essential agreements aim to set the tone for learning. A copy of your child's classroom essential agreement will be emailed home soon.
- Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) expectations are being taught. Teachers unpack the expectations with our students and then reinforce desired behaviours by rewarding DABs (Displaying Amazing Behaviour) tickets.
- Students participate in social and emotional learning lessons which aim to support them in recognising and verbalising their emotions and building strategies help them regulate.

When we invest early and establish a positive, caring and trusting school culture, our students are provided with every opportunity to succeed.

Have you heard that broad-brimmed hats are the latest rage? The Cancer Council of Australia tells us that UV damage accumulated during childhood and adolescence is linked to an increased risk of skin cancer in later life.

At Richardson Primary School we:

- Require all children and workers to wear hats when they are spending time outside between August and May.
 Recommended hats include broad-brimmed, bucket with deep crown and legionnaire.
- ✓ Students without an adequate hat (or clothing) are required to play in the shade, 'No Hat, Play in the Shade'.
- ✓ Minimise, where possible, outdoor activities and events between 11am and 3pm during the daylight saving/summer period.
- ✓ Students who choose to wear sunglasses are supported. A close fitting, wrap-around style meeting AS 1067 standard will offer best eye protection against UV damage.
- ✓ Encourage children to use available shade for outdoor activities, especially during the daylight-saving period.
- ✓ Require all staff and encourage parents to act as positive role models by demonstrating sun protection behaviour.
- ✓ Ensure the school and all staff are aware of their Work Health and Safety responsibilities and duty of care regarding Occupational UV Exposure.
- ✓ Regularly reinforce sun protection practices in a positive way through student and teacher activities.
- Ensure that the Directorate's sun protection policy is reflected in the planning for all outdoor events (camps, sporting activities, excursions).
- ✓ Have a generous amount of shade with the number of trees and shade structures throughout the grounds.
- ✓ Provide sunscreen to each classroom which is accessible to students.


Please ensure your child comes to school with a broad brimmed hat. We will remind students to apply sunscreen and if they don't have a hat, they will be re-directed to play in the shade.



Improve learning and achievement for all students

This year, Kindergarten, year 1 and 2 will be implementing the InitiaLit program. InitiaLit is an evidence-based, wholeclass literacy program providing all children with the essential core knowledge and strong foundations to become successful readers and writers. The program consists of whole class explicit instruction, groups and independent activities, storybook lessons, games, spelling, grammar and vocabulary, and handwriting lessons. Teachers will also be supplementing the program with additional writing lessons. InitiaLit focuses on teaching students phonics skills they need to read as well as vocabulary, oral language and listening comprehension.

InitiaLit will run Monday to Friday in the morning block. Please ensure that your child/ren arrives to school on time so that they do not miss any of their InitiaLit lesson.



You will have noticed that student book packs looked a little different this year with the introduction of 'dotted-third' exercise books. These books will support the teaching and learning of handwriting across the school, Kindergarten through to year 6. Students will write for authentic purposes for a range of audiences daily whilst learning correct letter formation, forming letters of a consistent size, further developing fine motor skills and dexterity.

Develop an expert teaching team

At the beginning of the year, all staff members at Richardson Primary School attended Berry Street training. The Berry Street Education Model focuses on supporting children with their learning, growth, and well-being. It aims to support children with learning to regulate their emotions, recognise stress, implement strategies to be calm and ready to learn. As a staff we will continue our learning journey with the Berry Street Education Model into next year.

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Provide a safe, inclusive, and respectful school culture

Following several years of feeling disconnected from our community, this year we look forward to welcoming families to be onsite and in our learning spaces. We started the year with our Welcome BBQ Breakfast, and it was pleasing to see so many of our families join us regardless of the colder than normal weather! We look forward to hosting a community breakfast at the beginning of each term.



This week we held our K-6 parent information sessions. Families were provided with information about classroom routines, expectations, the teaching and learning programs and what the year has in store for students. It was a fabulous turn out and many parents have told us they appreciated the opportunity to connect with teachers and clarify questions. One parent stated, "I attended two information sessions, and I must say that they were fantastic! I learnt so much about what my kids are doing at school. The teachers did such a good job!". The slideshows that were presented at each session will be emailed home to families as will a curriculum document that provides information about the learning in your child's class.

On Wednesday 1 March, we will hold the first of our 'Drop In Days'. These open days will provide families with the opportunity to witness teaching and learning in action. You are invited to pop in at a time convenient to you and see your child engaging in learning. Family members are encouraged to quietly walk through, observe, and watch the magic happen!

At the end of the term, Learning Journeys will occur. Learning Journeys are a celebration of progress and provide an opportunity for your child to share their learning with you.

We look forward to passing you in the hallway, seeing you on our playground and welcoming you into our school.

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
Learning in Action @ RPS

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YWCA Canberra Clubhouse overview

YWCA'S Canberra Clubhouse is a free, out of school learning space that provides young people, aged 10 to 18 in the Tuggeranong region, with access to the latest technology, as well as mentoring and support to grow their skills in science, technology, engineering, arts, mathematics, and music (STEAMM). With the essential support from our cross-sector partners, volunteers, Tuggeranong community, and our dedicated staff, members can thrive in a supportive environment that fosters their creativity and learning in areas such as coding, 3D printing, photography, film making, textiles, game design, web design, tactile and digital art, electronics, music production, and more. At the Clubhouse, members will engage in long-term projects in collaboration with other members and with the support from a dedicated Clubhouse staff member.

Application and membership

To ensure the Clubhouse is delivering a high quality program that aligns with the Clubhouse Network Learning Model, prospective members must complete an application to become a member. Applicants can request to attend one of the two days available with a limited number of places available. Membership to the Clubhouse will now be on a term-by-term basis, meaning an application for membership will need to be submitted each term. Applications will be assessed on their suitability for this program based on the Learning Model, interest in STEAMM, and prior engagement in the Clubhouse program. Priority will be given to young people who live or attend school in the Tuggeranong region. Equitable access is important to us, we will do our best to accommodate all eligible young people. Applicants will be contacted in the last week of the school holidays with the outcome of their application and successful applicants will need to complete a more comprehensive membership form to give additional information and to provide consent. If a place is not able to be offered, the young person will placed on a waiting list and contacted if a place becomes available.

- · Mondays will be dedicated to projects focused on engineering and technology
- · Wednesdays will be dedicated to projects focused on art and music
- The following is what members can expect in a typical afternoon at the Clubhouse:
 - · 3:00pm afternoon tea (fruit and filling snacks)
 - 3:15pm circle time for group bonding, announcements, and project brainstorming/updates
 - 3:30pm working on projects
 - 5:00pm working on projects with gaming and free play also permitted
- 6:00pm Clubhouse closes
