### Improve learning and achievement for all students

This week saw the school hall transformed into a visual art wonderland. The 2024 Art Show was a huge success with families and students flowing through the doors to view a culmination of visual art techniques taught throughout the year. Art pieces from preschool to year 6 were on display, showcasing students' developing skills, techniques and processes. A huge thank you is extended to Mr Fraser and the Art Show Committee for putting on such a wonderful event which showcased the students' learning.

On Monday the year 5/6 students are venturing to Borambola Camp near Wagga Wagga. They are looking forward to three, fun-filled days of physical challenges such as archery, rock climbing, mud run and team initiatives. The bus will be leaving bright and early with departure set for 7.15am sharp. Staff will endeavour to post Facebook updates however this will depend on the network service available. We look forward to hearing about their adventures when they return on Wednesday afternoon.

Next Tuesday will see our Koori Preschool class venturing to Tidbinbilla Nature Reserve for their last Learning on Country event for the year. To celebrate, the Koori Butterflies have invited their friends from the Black Cockatoos to join them. We look forward to seeing the Butterflies extend their learning of culture by sharing their knowledge and understanding with the Black Cockatoos. Learning on Country has been a new initiative this year thanks to the support of Transport Canberra, who have provided buses free of charge to the Koori Preschool sites across Canberra.

As part of the transition process for our incoming 2024 preschool children, Ms Nuzda and Miss James have been meeting with families and children for the preschool interviews. This is an opportunity for our staff to connect with families and learn a little more about the ways in which we can support the newest members of our community when starting school. We will also open our preschool doors to these new families next Wednesday 29 November between 9.15am and 10.15am for the Preschool Open Morning.

### Develop an expert teaching team

Student reports are progressing and will be going home to families at the end of week 9 via email. If your family circumstances have changed this year and you are requiring two reports to be sent home, please contact the front office.

Our work continues, examining updates to both the Australian Curriculum version 9.0 and the Early Years Learning Framework version 2.0. The Australian Curriculum is reviewed every 6 years and updates are made to ensure it continues to meet the needs of students now and into the future. Teachers here at Richardson Primary School have been working in teams to reflect on current planning documents and delve into the changes and updates to both the Australian Curriculum and the Early Years Learning Framework.

The ACT Education Directorate has recently announced that next year there will be a student free day each term. These are the first day of each school term:

- · Term 1, Monday 29 January 2024
- · Term 2, Monday 29 April 2024
- · Term 3, Monday 22 July 2024
- · Term 4, Monday 14 October 2024.

We use student-free days for staff development, enabling us to plan in a student-free environment. Student-free planning days have been expanded from one to four days from 2024 as part of our new Teaching Staff Enterprise Agreement which prioritises better teacher workloads for educational leadership, teaching and learning.

At Richardson Primary School we look for opportunities to extend our students' experiences and enrich learning opportunities. For the last six years we have had the fabulous Deb Clarke, a parent from our RPS community, providing the Scholastic Book Club to all students and families.

### MEDICATION DEPARTMENTAL POLICY REQUIRES SCHOOLS TO ENSURE THAT:

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### **News from Kirrang**

We cannot believe that we are nearing the end of Term 4 already! We have had a busy start to the term and will continue working hard as we get ready to transition into years 2 and 3 next year.

### Literacy

Each morning we continue with our InitiaLit program which supports the development of our reading and writing skills.









### Mathematics

This term we have been revising addition and subtraction strategies, supporting students' learning through hands on manipulatives and playing maths games. Students have also been exploring number bonds and probability.



### Inquiry

In our inquiry unit, students have begun to investigate at sound and light. Students have been engaging in experiments to explore how sound is made and travels. This learning was also supported by the help of Barbara Flemming who introduced Indigenous artifacts to show how sound was used in Indigenous cultures. Students investigated light and shadows outside, and consolidated this learning by creating sculptures and drawing the shadow.



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### Other learning opportunities

Students have been using ICT to consolidate their learning across all learning areas. Over the last few weeks, students have been playing 'Are You Smarter Than a Computer?"

Students had the opportunity to participate in another Gecko Sports clinic, this time focusing on further building their gross motor skills.

Students were also very excited to experience their first Kakadu Fun Day!









### Iterika Newsletter Term 4 3/4B and 3/4C

Wow, the year is flying by! The students in Iterika have been extremely busy fully immersing themselves in all learning tasks. We are particularly proud of the risks the students are taking with their learning and how they are taking on all learning challenges that are set for them. We are seeing success for every student, every day, in all areas of the curriculum.


### Writing

In Writers Workshop, we are working through the writing process of planning, drafting our writing, editing, and then recrafting our writing. We are learning how to write informative texts, including information reports. During our Writers Workshops, we are learning how to write information in our own words and put our writing under subheadings. We have also been learning how to put paragraphs in our writing, ensuring that we have only one idea in each paragraph.

### Reading

In readers workshops, we have continued to develop our reading strategies of reading on and inferring. We have been working hard on the reading strategy of determining importance where the students need to establish the key pieces of information in the text they are reading, and then rewrite that





information in their own words. We have had a focus on non-fiction texts this term that we are using to support our research about different topics. Through daily guided reading sessions, the students work in small groups to read and comprehend texts using a variety of reading strategies. After the students have read, they participate in a discussion about the text to support their comprehension skills.

### Maths

In mathematics we have been developing a greater understanding of multiplication and division, 2D and 3D shape, fractions, area and perimeter. We have had lots of time being hands on with manipulatives to make concrete connections with these operations. We have been focussing on place value looking into decimal numbers and how they are connected to fractions. We have been developing the skill of measuring using the metric system. Students are becoming increasingly confident in measuring the length of different objects with rulers. The students have been learning how to measure the area and perimeter of different shapes.

### Geography

We have been learning about the states and territories of Australia, and the Aboriginal tribe map of Australia. We have been investigating the neighbouring countries of Australia. Through our inquiry, we are exploring different countries and comparing those countries to Australia.

### **Gecko Sports**



In PE, we have been really lucky to have been learning new table tennis skills with Jack from Gecko Sports. Jack teaches us a new set of skills each week to prepare the students to play a game of table tennis.



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### Handwriting

This term the students have had the opportunity to show their skills in handwriting and earn themselves their L-plate pen licences. This has been met with great excitement and some students have progressed to their P-plate licence as well.

### Home Reading

Home readers have been sent home in the last few weeks. Some

students also have high frequency words in their folders to support them in recognising and understanding these words in different texts. We are asking that the students bring their books to school to change them on Tuesdays and Thursdays.
